CD "ROTĀ" -ALREADY VERY SOON

We are delighted to announce that the production of our new CD has been completed. As we have already mentioned, this will be a special release, as all of the songs are compositions by Laura, rooted in folk songs and Baltic music.

The album "ROTĀ" will be available to listeners around the world from November 7. We will "release it into the world" in a month when the feeling of belonging and patriotism resonates particularly strongly in all our hearts.

The album recordings were completed in the summer, but behind the scenes, the work continued for a long time. This has been a collaboration with a great team, and we would like to express our sincere thanks to:

- sound engineers Andris Ūzems and Krišs Vesimanis,
- sound mixer Pauls Dāvis Megi,
- and Sigita Prola, who created the album's visual identity.

The album's visual image was inspired by nature and Jānis Cimze's "Dziesmu rotas" (1872) edition — one of the most significant monuments of Latvian cultural heritage.

Last year, at the Latvian Ethnographic Open-Air Museum, after filming the video for the song "ROTĀ," our trusted photographer Kaspars Teilāns captured moments when we were all together.

When Laura decided that this would also be the name of the album, these pictures took on a special meaning, and we realized that this shot, taken outside the photo studio, was exactly what the new CD needed.




OCTOBER AGENDA

The start of the school year has been difficult this year. Not only does the Dailes course still not have stable premises, but the RDKS has also moved. My days consist of room logistics and a pile of unnecessary bureaucratic battles – not very inspiring in the musical department's 10th anniversary year. However, Latvian Voices brought a lot of joy in September with a wonderful tour!

October is my birthday month, which I started this year with a trip to London to get a little taste of the world and sing away the creativity that has been stifled by Latvia's bureaucratic dry air.

However, something creative has already happened this season, something I have been working on for more than half a year with Maksims Busels. We met on the show "Pārdziedi mani" and our interests coincided - I wanted to compose and he wanted to perform pop songs. We have written a bunch of original songs, and in October, three of them will reach listeners.

My October this year promises to bE colorful. A concert in the Riga Dome Chapter Hall with the ensemble "Džezbaroks," which will feature music from both the Baroque era in Riga and 20th-century Latvian composers with references to earlier times. There will also be a piece written especially for this concert and this group of musicians by band member Jānis Rubiks. Then there will be a concert in Jūrmala at the Dzintari Concert Hall with Jānis Lūsēns and Ziafrīds Muktupāvels, where we will perform songs inspired by Caks' poetry.

Another new addition to my calendar this fall is a new joB, I have become a vocal teacher for the Latvian Academy of Culture's mixed choir Sõla, and at the end of October we will travel to Tolosa in the Basque Country, Spain, to compete for the European Grand Prix.



In parallel with the performances in Latvia, I have started ERASMUS studies in Graz, Austria, where I will continue to study conducting, as well as simply gain new and fresh knowledge, vision, and experience!

MThis October is a very special and different month for me. It is the longest period in the group's 15-year history that I have been away from Latvian Voices and focused on my activities as a composer. I started the month in Buffalo, USA, where the choir Vox Lusciniae rehearsed my original program. At the same time, I visited local universities and schools to give master classes to choirs that sing my compositions. I really hope that next time I will be able to go there with Latvian Voices, because our music is very popular in Buffalo.

When I return home, I will go to the Ilūkste region, where I will be happy to share my experience in a cappella arrangement and composition with local music enthusiasts. I really hope that this will bring a new repertoire to both ensembles and choirs.

In mid-October, my travels will take me to sunny Barcelona, where the Canta Al Mar 2025 choir competition will take place. I have been entrusted with the honor of being one of the jury experts. This month will conclude with a visit to Finland to work with the choirs Kamari Kuoro Värinä and Grex Musicus, where we will rehearse compositions by myself and other Baltic composers. It will be a productive month in my life as a composer, enriching my experience and inspiring me to write new pieces for both Latvian Voices and other ensembles.

LATVIJAS LEPNUMS 2025

One of the special events in October will be our participation in the Latvijas Lepnums awards ceremony. We will congratulate this year's winners with a performance of the song "Jādzied"

The awards ceremony will take place for the 22nd time and will be broadcast on TV3 on November 18, the day of the proclamation of the Republic of Latvia.



Every year, Latvijas Lepnums awards ceremony honors individuals who, through their work and self-sacrifice, make Latvia a better place by promoting positive change, fostering empathy and inclusion, and improving interpersonal relationships and public opinion. The ceremony has become a tradition that invites us to appreciate the people who are with us every day, introducing us to stories about outstanding, sincere, good people who are right here among us. The awards are presented to the winners by well-known personalities in Latvia, as well as by people who are important to the award recipients and whose paths have crossed in life.

BLAST FROM THE PAST: OCTOBER 2019

The last time we traveled outside this continent as a group was more than five years ago, before the COVID-19 pandemic.

In America, the Latvian Association, with the support of the Ministry of Culture, organized an interactive concert program called "The Power of Song in Latvia," dedicated to the centenary of the Latvian state. The program, created by Associate Professor Dr. Guntis Šmidchens and us, combined concerts, lectures, and master classes, introducing Latvian song traditions and the history and significance of the Song and Dance Festival.

We performed at the California Institute of the Arts. Of course, many local Latvians attended, including the world-renowned Latvian composer Lolita Ritmane.

We enjoyed Chicago in the classic tourist spirit. We didn't stay there, but we did visit the cities around Lake Chicago—Milwaukee and Kalamazoo—for concerts.





While we were there, we had the honor of going on a tour of the Latvian Center Garezers. It is a center for Latvian culture, education, and community life located in Three Rivers, Michigan, USA. This organization was founded in 1965 with the purchase of a former Girl Scout camp and has since served as an important center for the Latvian community in North America.

The place is especially known for its Latvian environment, including streets named after regions of Latvia and more than 100 buildings, including a library and museums.

On October 15, we performed at the Millennium Stage concert hall at the Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts in Washington, D.C. It was our second time performing at this prestigious venue.
